2.4 Bosberaad Feedback

A committee bosbenad was held on the 4th of November. Paul Fatti was invited to attend as facilitator. The decisions that have been made during this bosbenad were substantial and important for the future of the club. Some of what has been decided will need to be voted on by the club members in order for the suggestions to be enforced. This will be presented at the AGM. Since one of these issues involves each at will be promised to the club.

The key issue that was debated was "where are we going as a club?" After deciding what we, as a committee, think that this ought to be, the remaining decisions and changes were made to support the direction we wish to take.

In our minds the issue of access to the Mountains is an important one and one that will require careful and deliberate planning to ensure that we continue to have access, specifically in those places that we do not own or have legal access rights to.

In order to be able to plan and execute plans we will need to have financial muscle and it is proposed that a specific levy be introduced in order to build up this muscle. This will be presented at the ACM

Another significant change is to the admission requirements. These have been expanded to allow alternative means of joining the club- not only through the requisite 4 meets. In doing so we have not make it any casel? (for flowce of you concerned about lowering of standards), we have merely introduced alternatives. These alternatives are outlined on a new application form and are being introduced after moment.

All of these topics were thoroughly discussed and debated and there was a balanced spread of viewpoints. It proved to be a valuable and useful day, and one which has properly set the scene for the next few years I think.

2.5 Crofton Weed Problem

Crofton weed (ageratina adenophera), a multi-stemmed soft shrub originally from Central America, has been making its appearance the past five years in many Magaliesberg kloofs near and in water streams. It has been spotted at Dome Kloof (some eradication has been done there), Mhlabatini and Castle Gorge, and there is a major infestation at Easter Kloof. (It is also present in

Kirstenbosch, UCT's gardens etc!).

Some biocontrol measures are currently in place in the Northern Province (Tzameen area), KwaZulu-Natal and the Cape, and host-specific gall files and a leaf-spot fungus from Mexico are being released. Because of low priority on a national scale (but not so for the Magaliesberg and for other infand mountain rangest), research funding for more destructive, effective natural enemies (insects or diseases from the areas of origins) sons or been forthcominic.

Recommended measures in the interim: 1) manual , 2) chemical control where there are large infestations. First go for sparse distributions. (Info from Stefan Neser rielsn@plant2.agric.za)

3 Expeditions and International Meets

3.1 Proposed trekking trip to Nepal

Is there anyone out there who has been dreaming about trekking to Everest Base Camp? and perhaps doing one or two of the dozens of other interesting things that there are to do in that amazing country? Here's your chance to make it happen!

I'm planning a trip to Nepal in October 2001. We will fly to Kathmandu via Singapore on Singapore Arlines, arriving there at about 11th00. We will have the rest of that day, and possibly the next, to do a bit of exploring, and visit the famed Monkey (Swayambunath) Temple. We will then fly from Kathmandu to Lukla (providing that the airstrip there has been re-opened) and spend the next 9 or 10 days walking up the Krumbu Valley to Gorak Shep. Along the way we will spend 2 days at the amazing Namche Bazar and 2 days at Dingboche, to allow for acclimatisation. This text will be portrally sku sponded.

At Corak Shep we will climb to the top of Kala Pattar (5,643 metres) for brilliant views of Everent (which is otherwise hidden) the Khumbu Icefail and Glader, Nuptee, Unobee, Pumori and other peaks. The next morning we will walk up to Everest Base Camp (5,320 metres) and return to Lobuche (4,830 metres) – you don't want to spend a second right at Gorak Shep unless

Then there will be a couple of options: if short of time, you can return to Lukla and fly back to Kathmandu, or you can go up to the beautiful Gokyo Lakes and then return to Lukla and Kathmandu – add another 5 days for this.

Lukka Airstrip will be closed for several months from January for upgrading. IF it is still closed by the time we go there, it will mean having to fly to a village called Phaptu and an extra 4 or 5 days have to be allowed to walk to Namche Bazar – excellent for acclimatising!

Flights into Kathmandu are always at a premium, so Fil be making reservations towards the end of January – far better to have seats that can be cancelled than not being able to get any seats!
